





Mr Walker - Faculty leader for Technology

My earliest memory of an inspirational spark outside my family was Mike Greaves, teacher at Great Moor Junior School, Stockport. From the September that we moved to his class, days at school which had previously seemed very long started to pass really quickly, I was actually enjoying all of the subjects that we were doing and I found myself working harder.

Lessons were frequently extended investigations that seemed to cover all aspects of the curriculum without us recognising the challenging new material being gently introduced day by day. Mr Greaves would use the local area to engage us. Lessons would frequently take us out of the school to visit local buildings where he would

tell us about amazing historical links to Cromwell and the Civil War, or we would go to investigate key geographical features of the area (usually the river Mersey). Stockport was made into the most fascinating place in the world....this clearly took a very special teacher!

Mr Greaves made Science exciting and Technology became much more than the 'cutting and sticking' it had previously been, Mr Greaves encouraged us to be creative and helped us to simplify the incredibly complex objects that we had designed so that we could make them successfully ourselves. I was soon making more and more 'things' and my career plan was set to become an Architect. (I eventually managed a Furniture Design degree – same principles - just on a smaller scale!)

Mr Greaves coached the football and cricket teams, and gave me my first opportunities to play in real matches. I now coach an under 10 cricket side and find myself frequently using the same coaching skills that helped me all of those years ago.

Mr Greaves was always patient, and somehow put up with me in the school brass band, playing endless off beats as a third cornet. I would get things wrong frequently, I didn't practice often enough but he would smile, encourage us and tell us how good we were as we found new ways to mess up the theme from Star Wars or some similar brass band classic of the late seventies.

The fascination for all things STEM and a love of cricket remain however the brass band membership has sadly long since lapsed. Mr Greaves was memorable for being such an enthusiast, being patient and funny. He was able to explain things so that I just seemed to 'get it.' Thank you Mr Greaves!



And the names, filling the vast expanse of white stone walls. I remember just staring, silent, stunned, trying to take in the sight that met my eyes. Of course, following the recent WW1 topic we had studied in History, I knew that this war had claimed the lives of 9 million men. But actually seeing this cemetery, just one cemetery out of many, containing the bodies and the names of those who fell in the four year long war...it was hard to comprehend.

To commemorate and remember those who lost their lives in WW1, we laid flowery wreaths at each memorial, with a reflective message on each. As well as the educational base of the trip, we had lots of fun socially too.

The highlight for me was Ypres. We were allowed to explore the town, seeking out shops that sold waffles (!) and Belgian chocolates. Furthermore, for some people on the trip, this was their first time abroad and so the whole experience of new currency, new road signs, new accents and so on, was very exciting. The visit to Cité Europe, the hypermarket full of shops was just perfect for keen shoppers such as myself!

It has been yet another busy year in the school library seeing an average of 90+ pupils visiting at break and lunch times. Helped by our excellent 2015-16 Pupil Librarians, we have issued/renewed 5202 books!

With the increasing use of digital technology for research combined with **our use of 'Topic Boxes' from the Schools Library Service etc. we have** been able to complete a major edit of our non-fiction section, resulting in 35 boxes of books being donated for use in African schools. The empty spaces were quickly filled with our ever expanding fiction collection, **including a new area of 'Group Reads'**.

Another major change happened just two weeks ago when we rearranged the fiction books from author surname order into Accelerated Reader order. We hope that this will prove an incentive for users to stray into new authors and genres whilst reading within their ZPD range.

The Accelerated Reader scheme continues to stimulate a buzz around reading with a total of 2,667 quizzes being taken by pupils in Years 7, 8 and 9 this year – that's a massive 104,518,581 words being read!!!

Finally, I must thank our outgoing Pupil Librarians for continued reliability and diligence to their duty during this last year.

History: A local murder investigation an enquiry 'The Longden Murder of 1867', was John Mapp guilty?

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
All Year 6 who will be coming to Mary Webb School in September joined us for two transition days on the 4th and 5th of July 2016.
